May God's peace and presence surround you in these days. One truth the past year has taught me time and time again is that we are a people who prayerfully and lovingly seek to embrace each other in our diversity. As we begin to emerge from the pandemic of COVID 19, our church leadership has heard the diversity of our church:

- ~ Some of you reading this letter have grown to love online worship. You can participate in the service and worship when your heart guides you, others find it easier to hear and control the volume. Plus, you can skip the sermon! *(That was a joke.)*
- ~ Some of you reading this letter have grown to love the outdoor 9 a.m. worship. The beauty of creation and time of day works for you. We have heard a desire to continue this as an option.
- ~ Some hunger to return to the sanctuary to experience the 10:55 a.m. livestream service in person.
- ~ Some of you find a bit of yourself in each of the above statements or need to continue on-line due to health concerns.

We love the thoughtfulness of each perspective and want you to feel our love as you sort through the next step for yourself. The Leadership has decided that beginning on Palm Sunday, March 28th, and continuing into April, we will offer three options for worship:

Option 1: Outdoor worship at 9 a.m. at the labyrinth – with lawn chairs, masks, and social distancing.

Option 2: Online livestream at 10:55 a.m. available on Facebook, YouTube, and our Website.

Option 3: In-person attendance in the sanctuary at 10:55 a.m. for up to 100 people (25% capacity) with masks, social distancing, and no singing.

We appreciate that in our diverse church there are different responses to the options. The decision to open our sanctuary for Palm Sunday worship at 25 percent capacity was done prayerfully and aware of risks. We want to meet our diverse church in meaningful ways. We will continue to watch positivity rate and listen to the CDC for best practices. If you are feeling ill or have a temperature, please do not attend either in-person options, but worship fully on-line with us. We encourage you, if possible, to be very aware of others' personal space needs and allow extra room for each person. Please use care if you have not received a vaccine yet. We will be cleaning the sanctuary prior to March 28th and moving forward each Sunday. We will be removing hymnals, pew pads, and papers from the pews. There will be hand sanitizer stations. You will be seated by an usher. There will be offering plates at

the back of the sanctuary or you can always give on-line. At this time, there will not be fellowship time following either in-person worship service and ask you to not congregate to talk inside the sanctuary. **The Zoom Coffee Hour at noon will continue in April.**

We are researching improving air flow in our air conditioning units to filter out viruses. However, we do not anticipate this will be done before Palm Sunday. We will keep you up-to-date as we know air quality is important.

If you decide you would like attend in-person, in the sanctuary worship service, reservations are REQUIRED. Reservations begin on the Monday prior to the Sunday service through Thursday at noon. For example, for Sunday, March 28 you may register on **Monday, March 22** until **Thursday, March 25 at noon** by emailing Pastor Wes or calling the church office. We will confirm that we have received your reservation by email or phone call. We will also create a waiting list, if necessary.

We will follow this same reservation schedule every week moving forward until further notice. **Reservations are on a first-come, first-serve basis.** Reservations can only be made for the upcoming Sunday services and cannot be made in advance for any of the following Sunday services. **Please do not try to register for in-person Easter worship at 10:55 a.m. in the sanctuary until Monday, March 29th.**

Please remember that the 9 a.m. outdoor service does **NOT** need registration; please do not call or email for that service. You are always welcome to show up with your lawn chair any Sunday for this service. Please remember that, in the event of inclement weather, this service is canceled.

Masks are mandatory for everyone ages 5 and above for admittance into the buildings and must be worn at all times.

Please arrive no more than 15 minutes prior to the start of the service. Please no handshakes or hugs! We encourage you to bow to each other to acknowledge your love.

Social distancing will be practiced so please follow the instructions of the ushers on where to sit. Ushers will also dismiss people after the postlude so as to direct traffic flow. We encourage you to exit the sanctuary and not congregate inside the building.

The Church Leadership continues to offer our love to every single person. If you would like to talk, please contact Pastor Wes or Carol Fields, moderator. Whatever choice you make, we pray you will find Holy Week this year will offer you a meaningful experience.

Green Team News: *Reduce, Reuse, Recycle*

On March 21, we received word from the National UCC that our application to be a Creation Justice Church was accepted. The hard work of **Rev. Dr. Sarah Melcher and Barbara Smith-Bacon** was commended as a model for how other churches could engage faithfully in this process. Thank you to everyone, especially to Sarah and Barbara for all their faithful work!



You may have heard of **Reduce, Reuse and Recycle**. The order of these is very intentional and important as applied to the items we use and consume. Given our highly consumptive lifestyles, it is imperative that we

understand where our items come from and how they are made, i.e., the upstream and downstream costs and implications of everything we use. In addition, it is important to know what happens after we no longer possess the item. Plastic residue has so permeated our environment that it is now being found in human tissues. In 2019, 54 million metric

tons of electronics were thrown away. Landfills are rapidly filling up; Sarasota County recently approved increasing the height of our landfill from 100 feet to 200 feet. It will be able to be seen from the furthest reaches of Myakka State Park's wilderness area.

Reducing the amount of what we use should be a top priority for each of us. There are myriad ways to reduce our consumption of water, food, gasoline, pesticides, clothes, and more. Some ways do create hardships, and some can be a delightful challenge ourselves. Once we have reduced our consumption in every way possible, we should find ways to **reuse** each item as long as it can be repaired. Modern production systems create short term obsolescence; repairing items is not an option or very expensive compared to buying a replacement. When purchasing an item, consider how you will dispose of it. When done with an item in good condition, donate it.



Only after we have diligently reduced and reused everything possible should **recycling** be considered. Currently, too many people start by "recycling." Nearly forty years ago in Florida there was an effort to require a deposit on all single serving beverage containers. It did not pass, but recycling was required. Consumer source recycling was determined to be the least expensive and most effective way to recycle. However, consumers didn't want to be bothered, so our Sarasota government entities worked toward - and have now achieved - a single container recycling program, with effective sorting and bundling technology for specified recyclables. Is it effective? The program director admits that their responsibility ends when the transport system crosses the county line, so they have no idea.

How can your faith journey include a simpler lifestyle by Reducing, Reusing and then, as a last resort, Recycling?



At the March Church Council Meeting **Pauline Geary**, co-chair of COLLAGE (Coalition Of Laity for Lesbian And Gay Equality) brought the following Covenant Statement. **OPEN and AFFIRMING COVENANT STATEMENT
First Congregational United Church of Christ (FCUCC)
Sarasota, Florida
March, 2021**

We of the First Congregational United Church of Christ in Sarasota, Florida, by vote of our Church Council and ratification by our congregation became an Open and Affirming Congregation in 2001, as documented in our church bylaws. We now re-commit to God and one another our covenant with our lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer/questioning sisters and brothers.

As we celebrate the diversity of the people of God, we commit to remain an Open and Affirming congregation that welcomes all our LGBTQ+ brothers and sisters with love and support. We will be a place in which they can be fully themselves, where their full selves are embraced and where their God-given talents are utilized in the life and work of the Church.

We honor the vision of those in our congregation who, more than 20 years ago, founded COLLAGE (Coalition of Laity for Lesbian and Gay Equality) to provide support for LGBTQ+ persons in the congregation and community. In league with COLLAGE, we will continue to reach out to and welcome LGBTQ+ persons into our church family. We will serve as a refuge from hurtful words and harmful actions and work toward eliminating social injustices too often directed against them.

This covenant statement is hereby adopted this 16th day of March, 2021, by unanimous vote of our Church Council.

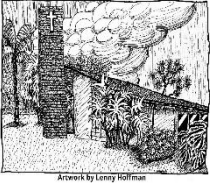
