





~ Silence & Stillness ~

Rumi's words open us to a different way of being. So often we want to compartmentalize and categorize the world (and people) into right and wrong. We are caught in cycles of binary thinking. Rumi encourages us to a space and place beyond that way; he calls this a field \sim a wide-open field \sim an expansive and expanding field. There our souls lie down (note the echo of Psalm 23), where the world is too full to talk about. There is silence and stillness. We realize the truth is there is too much for us to comprehend or control \sim mentally, emotionally, relationally, and physically.

When I hear Rumi's words, I remember in the summertime being bored, laying in the grass, watching the clouds go by. Laying in the grass connecting the soil in my soul to the earth from which all of us are crafted. Laying in the grass staring at the sky reminded me of the vastness of the world and the smallness when I felt an ant crawling on my leg. Laying in the grass provoked and evoked within me a peacefulness that was more a gift and not about my own correctness or competency. Those summer days not concerned about what time it was and being unproductive were a blessing.

Pastor Wes Vacation Days: June 14 – June 20 August 7 – August 13 October 2 – October 8 I think Rumi is inviting us into stillness and silence. What comes into your mind when you hear the word, "Silence"? Silence can mean quiet, calm, and slowing down. Silence can mean loneliness and an unsettling stillness or even restlessness. *When have you experienced quiet in a holy way*? When has silence been uncomfortable? Sometimes silence can be hurtful or unwelcome. Sometimes we need silence and stillness and other times we can feel silenced by another's comments. Beyond binary thinking, both are true.

Maybe you have heard that the same letters are used to spell "silent" **and** "listen". Maybe you have heard the quote, "God's first language is silence. Everything else is a translation." which is attributed to Thomas Keating who is a leader in contemplative prayer. Maybe you've read Mother Teresa of Calcutta who wrote, "We cannot find God in noise or agitation. Nature: trees, and grass grow in silence. The stars, the moon, the sun move in silence."

This June, I invite us to begin the season of summer with moments of stillness and silence. Up front I want to say that my intention here is **NOT** to make you a monk or nun or levitate five inches off the ground. I am not trying to sell you something or guarantee that you will have a spiritually enlightened experience that transforms your life. There are times when meditation and centering prayer for five minutes can bring calm amid the storms of life. And times when for all five minutes you will feel seasick from the perpetual motion of life. What I am encouraging right now is for you to take five minutes. To go out into the field or at least outside. Venture beyond all the "shoulds" and notifications dinging on your phone/computer and the voices gnashing their terrible teeth trying to tell you that you are losing on some imaginary scoreboard. *Go and be* ~ and you don't have to lie down in the grass…but take a chair and sit by a tree. Or you can stand barefoot in the grass or go to the beach to let the waves kiss your toes.

Beginning the week of May 29th, my Morning Meditations will invite you into summer stillness. The wonderful part of this is you can do this wherever you are. You don't need some special, set aside space; you need to be where you are in that moment. It is my prayer that amid the busyness and fullness of our lives, we will find sacred pauses every day to sit and be embraced/held by the one who calls us "Beloved".

The History of our Beautiful Cross By Carol Seltzer (Assisted by Kathi Taylor & Greg Chestnut)

In October of 1993 the new pipe organ, built by Dan Jaeckel, was installed. Decisions were made at that time to re-design the Chancel area of the sanctuary by an Esthetic committee led by Kathi Taylor, a local artist, and Greg Chestnut.

They enlisted Norman Hervieux, Head of the Design Department of Ringling School of the Arts and Design. Norman is now a member of our congregation. His design included a cross located in the "Center of Your Field of Vision" and he was explicit about the size and placement of the cross. It was to be the same width of the center pipe and placed directly in line with that pipe. A subtle design feature suggested by Norman was to bevel the edges and to place a halogen spotlight above it.

The design for the entire area was inspired by nature, and leaves were incorporated at the top of the organ pipes. Dr. John Syster, pastor at that time, loved a milkweed garden that attracted butterflies and so the leaves at the top of the organ pipes are milkweed.

The committee also engaged Pedro Cobian, a famous Sarasota artist/sculptor, who submitted several cross designs, but the committee did not think any of them where "right" for us.

Kathi Taylor was at a loss for an idea that night. She prayed: *God, what would you like on this cross?* And just in front of her was her live and growing pathos plant. She made a cross out of cardboard and attached the leafy vine from the pathos plant. It represented that **Christ is the vine and we are the branches.** (John 15:5). "This is a good vision/core value for our church. We have many branches (various passions and perspectives on faith) in our church, but we are all connected to a vine of faith, love, and Christ together." ~ Pastor Wes

When Kathi presented her idea, the committee immediately knew it was the right design. Kathi worked diligently with Pedro Cobian to create the perfect silver cross with seven bronze leaves one of the leaves is on the back to inspire the choir.

Then, in February 1994, after much work and collaboration, our beautiful cross was dedicated.

Wear Orange on June 4th to Remember Victims of Gun Violence




Hadiya Pendleton was 15 years old, standing in a Chicago park, chatting with school friends a decade ago when she was shot and killed. She was not the intended target. The week before, she had performed at events for <u>President Obama's</u> <u>second inauguration</u>, and Michelle Obama attended her funeral.

Hadiya's friends decided to wear orange after Hadiya's death to raise awareness about gun violence. One friend explained: "Orange is basically the color hunters wear to signal to other hunters not to shoot them. **So that's why we're wearing it — to say, 'Don't shoot me'."**

Since then, activists throughout the country have worn orange on a day or a weekend in June to raise awareness about the pandemic of gun deaths in this country. So, get out your orange and wear it as often as possible anywhere you go from June 2nd through 4th.

Our church council has agreed, as it did last year, to designate a special **Wear Orange Day** to remember the many victims. We encourage you to wear orange in any form – a shirt, a dress, a tie, shoes, a hat, whatever you have – at services here on June 4th.

We also joined several organizations in requesting that the city and county commissions in Sarasota and Manatee approve their own proclamations for **Wear Orange Day**.



Family Promise Update



Home for Good and **Francis House** are two current programs which our congregation supports. **Home for Good** serves families in their own homes by providing prevention, diversion, and stabilization. Since 2020, this program has served nearly 300 families and 600 children.

Though we lost our **Francis House** several months ago, we have secured a new home with a June opening date. **Francis House** serves homeless pregnant women that have other children in their care.

Family Promise is actively seeking a day center where we can house homeless families again.



There are many ways you can support these missions:

Provide a meal Do laundry Visit with families and children Respite care for a new mother Help with homework Other

To re-open Francis House we need:

For babies: baby wash/shampoo, microwave sterilizer bags for bottles, baby pacifiers, baby lotions/diaper rash crème, waterproof mattress pads (pack and play size), muslin swaddle blankets, bottle replacement nipples (Dr. Brown/Tommee tippy), baby layette sets, diapers (new-born or size one), Diaper Genie refill bags.

For moms: body wash, share sanitizer, disposable pads (36X36), hand/body lotion, nursing pads (washable), hair styling tools (dryer/curling iron), small flashlights/batteries.

General supplies: *insect repellent, sunscreen (adult/child), laundry soap/bleach, paper towels, facial tissues, toilet paper, dishwasher soap/tabs, dish soap, kitchen/bath cleaners, Swiffer duster refills, light bulbs, tall garbage can liners.*

The Green Team has recently planted three young trees on our church grounds. In honor of Earth Day 2023, a Southern Magnolia was planted in the church's front yard on the north side and a Slash Pine on the south side. Both trees are native to Florida and will succeed a much older generation of trees already on campus.

In the church's backyard, a Marlberry tree has been planted near the labyrinth and close to the butterfly garden. Marlberry trees are native to Florida and love the shade, so they make wonderful "understory" trees. The flowers attract butterflies, and the berries are appreciated by the birds.

It is our hope that the addition of these trees will do more than just beautify the church grounds. Trees are beneficial to the environment in numerous ways. They help produce oxygen and filter out pollutants to clean the air. In addition, they also help preserve water levels in the soil. Trees provide shelter and nesting sites for many species of birds, butterflies, and other wildlife.

Mayomi is living a new life in America because of the help he received to get him out of Nigeria and into the United States. He has claimed asylum and has since become a nurse.

He is amazed at, and appreciative of, the freedom he has experienced as a gay man in America. He wants others to be aware and understand the tyranny LGBTQ+ people experience in other parts of the world and be warned against it happening in America.

The History of Juneteenth

On June 17, 2021, President Biden signed into law making Juneteenth a national holiday. African American communities have celebrated Juneteenth for more than a century but, like so much of Black history, it was virtually unknown by most Americans. The Juneteenth story is important because it celebrates the emancipation of enslaved Africans illegally held in Texas after the passage of the 13th Amendment. It is also a good lesson on the importance of accurate storytelling. As we approach Juneteenth 2023, we confront backlash from those who do not want truthful history told or taught. Juneteenth tells an important American story and celebrates the remarkable people who made it possible. Their legacy deserves nothing less than accuracy and admiration.

The popular narrative begins with the arrival of Union General Gordon Granger and 1800 soldiers in Galveston, Texas, on June 18th, 1865, to announce General Order Number 3: "*The people are informed that in accordance with a Proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free. This involves an absolute equality of personal rights and rights of property, between former masters and slaves, and the connection heretofore existing between them, become that between employer and hired labor..."*

Granger's order arrived two years after the Emancipation Proclamation, five months after the passage of the 13th Amendment and two months after Lee's surrender at Appomattox. The narrative would lead one to believe that enslaved Africans were unaware of national events. The enslaved knew about the War, the Proclamation, and the 13th Amendment. They were celebrating the fact that the presence of Granger's troops meant they could now exercise those rights.

At the outset of the War, enslaved Africans escaped to the Union lines whenever and wherever possible. Their ever-increasing numbers threatened to hinder Union war plans until the Department of the Army organized to employ them. As we learn in this quote from an enslaved man named Felix Haywood, this proximity was an information pipeline. "We knowed what was goin' on in the war all the time. We all felt like heroes, and nobody had made us that way but ourselves." Historian Jamelle Bouie expressed the point in these terms. "When secession turned to war, it was enslaved people who turned the narrow conflict over union into a revolutionary war for freedom." Who freed the slaves? The slaves freed the slaves." More than 200,000 freed and formerly enslaved Africans would serve and more than 40,000 of those would die fighting for freedom.

Juneteenth is indeed a day to celebrate and remember. Families will gather around good food and friends and pay homage to our ancestors. These words from historian Kate Mazur, are instructive. "To commemorate Juneteenth is to recognize the importance of slavery in U.S. history, to remember the horrors of bondage and the jubilation of freedom." Our truthful memory is a worthy offering.
