Looking at the dwindling days of 2023, what is the plan for your spiritual growth? **Come talk to me if this question awakens YOUR curiosity.**

Greg's Vacation Days: August 28 – September 11 After the plan, comes *making ready the space*. We didn't just start tearing up tile (although that is often what you see in home improvement shows). Many hands moved furniture, protected items, removed baseboards, and countless other tasks. This reminds me that spiritual growth and renovation takes time. It doesn't happen immediately or instantly in the blink of an eye.

Next, came the *noise* of removing tile and installing the new T-Loop System. This was a reminder that our growing faith can be **messy**. I wonder if our Sunday clothing needs to be exchanged for a pair of paint-stained jeans and torn shirt when we are working with God on our faith/soul/life. Note that the renovation of our relationship with God is always a two-way street. We are never alone. And it can help to have others share the workload. I never saw just one person here as a volunteer or on the work crew, there were always at least two. Something to consider as we renovate our faith.

Next, the new tile was *put in place*. This, too, took time, measuring and measuring again just to make sure. I know I sometimes can rush through my devotional time to get to my "real" work of pastoral ministry. But what if tending to my relationship with God is as vital and important for any other activity or ministry you or I or we do together?



In September, I pray, we will celebrate and rededicate our sanctuary to the glory of God. **Worship remains one of our core values as a church.** Worship is being awake and aware and granting access to God's presence, practicing openness and prayer, and letting God's love loose in our lives. Worship is vital and is our weekly encounter with the Eternal.

I do pray that if you are interested in exploring further the ongoing and unfolding renovation of faith and life with God, you will come talk to me. I look forward to seeing you in worship in the days and weeks ahead.

Strong Voices Lecture Series Offerings

October 16th ~ Re-Entry at Project 180: Hear current and former Project 180 residents describe the everyday life of a returning citizen—life prior to release, the hurdles they've overcome, what surprised them most, and what the future holds.

October 19th ~ Criminal Justice Debt on the Road to Re-Entry: Professor Laura I. Appleman, JD, discusses how criminal justice costs—fees, fines, court costs, probation payments, mandatory classes, and non-payment penalties—overwhelmingly affect reentering citizens and can lead to years of indebtedness.



Prof. Appleman, JD, is a member of the faculty at the College of Law at Willamette University in Salem, Oregon where she is the Van Winkle Melton Professor of Law and a University Research Integrity Officer. Appleman is a member of the Yale Law School Executive Committee, a member of the Bar of the City of New York and has worked with the Brennan Center for Justice on issues of indigent defense and criminal procedure.

CREATION JUSTICE NEWS

The Green Team currently has oversight of the butterfly garden at First Congregational United Church of Christ back by the labyrinth. This involves planting, watering, and weeding as we help new plants to adapt to their garden home.

When a plant or tree is not doing well in the garden, we replace it with a plant native to Florida. In general, a Florida native plant is one that existed within the state boundaries prior to European settlement. Why is it important to plant Florida native plants? They have existed here for thousands of years and have adapted to the climate and soil conditions. That helps to reduce the need for fertilizing and irrigating.



Another reason for planting native plants in the butterfly garden is that specific indigenous species of butterflies rely on particular plant species. For thousands of years, butterflies have drawn nectar and found sustenance from native plants and trees. They also lay their eggs there.

If we want to preserve the wonderful diversity of our Florida butterflies, we will continue to supply the plants and trees that are part of our native heritage. 
