On September 17th, we re-dedicated our sanctuary space to the glory of God and prayed that future generations will find this to be a place where ALL are welcome.

One of the first hymns that we sang to the tiles and a melody that soaked into the cushions was the hymn, "All are welcome". Pray the final verse with me:

Let us build a house where all are named, their songs and visions heard and loved and treasured, taught, and claimed as words within the Word. Built of tears and cries and laughter, prayers of faith and songs of grace. Let this house proclaim from floor to rafter: All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome in this place.




As those words open our sacred imaginations, I turn to the second note of gratitude to our amazing wordsmithing group who gathered comments and thoughts on our Core Values.

At the leadership retreat in January 2023, we began looking at our mission, vision, and core value statements, which are now 10 years old. Each of our Teams and Covenant Groups reviewed the current documents and made suggestions. In April, we hosted an after-church conversation about core values led by Jim Butterworth. Over the summer, a diverse group worked to incorporate the feedback we received. We give thanks to **Jim Butterworth, Harold Mezile, Nancy Morris, Cindy Woodling, Nancy Taylor, Sandi Armstrong, Lucy Tobias, and Dick Miller** who all brought their faithfulness to the table.



On Sunday, September 10th, I invited you to think of our Core Values as words that grow within us and among us like a vine. The six core value words are (in random order—NOT ranked or rated) justice, stewardship, worship, welcome, belonging, and caring. These words overlap like the leaves of a vine. These words all spring forth from the same source—our Creator who loves all creation into being. I invite you to think about how we embrace these words now and how might we embody these words in the future?

Beginning in late October, Jim Butterworth will be facilitating a four-week discussion series this fall based on *Christianity for the Rest of Us* by Diana Butler-Bass which considers the shape of emerging Christianity and the renewal of mainline Protestant churches such as our UCC. Butler-Bass shares examples of inspiring work which congregations around the nation are doing in vital areas of church life such as hospitality, worship, justice, healing, and diversity.



On four Monday afternoons from **October 30 through November 20 at 4:00 p.m.** in the Oasis Center and on Zoom, participants will discuss a few of these "signposts of renewal" each week and consider how we are accomplishing God's work in these key areas of our congregational life. I pray you will consider reading this book to take our six core values from the page to our lived faithfulness as a church. In 2024, we will begin our 70th year of ministry. In 2024, I will begin my 11th year of ministry with you. Our renewed sanctuary and core values are a firm foundation for us to build into the future!

Please stay for our SURE (Sarasota United for Responsibility and Equity) house meeting in Syster Hall at noon—See pg. 7. We will be recognizing World Hunger Day with breads from around the world.

October 22 ~ We turn to how Elijah faced down 450 priests of Baal in 1 Kings 18, selected verses. Please stay following the second service for our **2024 budget presentation**. We will live stream the presentation for those at home.

October 29 ~ Water Sunday* ~ At both services, please bring your water from travels this last year. As October wraps up, we hear how Elijah fled with fear in 1 Kings 19 and how God appears in a still small whisper. This is also Reformation Sunday which reminds us that our faith is the unfinished house in which we all dwell—still under construction! Safety team update in Syster Hall at noon.



November 5 ~ All Saints Sunday** ~ We will sing out about how the chariot carries Elijah away and the mantle of leadership is passed to Elisha, 2 Kings 2. We will light candles in honor of our saints at both services.

*Water Sunday \sim Our church has a tradition of honoring our travels with the gathering of waters which will be October 29^{th} at both services. Please bring a small amount of water OR if you happen to forget to gather water, you can bring some from your Sarasota faucet too! This is a wonderful chance to share where we have been and how we are connected to each other.

**All Saints Day ~ If you have a saint, you would like named during our celebration on November 5th, please let Pastor Wes know. We will light a candle for the great cloud of witnesses who surround us and sustain us in these days.
