Butterfly Garden Notes ~ New Trees on Campus

As fall has come, we can see that this extra dry summer has been hard on the vegetation on our campus. However, the Green Team has been faithfully watering our new plantings so things look good in the butterfly garden.

During the dry summer we had very few butterflies but now it seems they are returning. We have seen Gulf Fritillaries and a Giant Swallowtail. The Monarchs should be returning soon.

> Come and look at our new coffee bushes, one of which was planted by Gary Pike, a new member of our group. After extensive pruning of the red-flowering jatropha, in a few months we should see a new growth of red blooms!

> Some of our other new native plants are the two blue Stoke's Asters, and another Starry Rosin, a yellow flower toward the center back of the garden. Our native Porter Weed has really taken off. Take a walk behind the Labyrinth, and you will see new buds ready to bloom on the Marlberry tree! Encouraging signs of growth are visible on the Slash Pine in front, and the Southern Magnolia.

We hope you take a cool fall stroll around campus enjoying our native plants!

Brady Sarasota ~ 7th Annual Vigil For All Victims of Gun Violence ~ December 8th @ 6 p.m.

Please join us in our Sanctuary on **Friday**, **December 8**, **at 6 p.m.** to hear our featured speaker, Erica Dorsey, whose son Aaron continues to recuperate from a gunshot wound to the head during the summer. Aaron is 13 years old and was riding his bike at the time of the shooting. Almost since that day, Erica has told his story in order to lobby for a change in our gun laws.



Special music will be provided at the vigil by Sheila Atkins, who has lived in Sarasota for over six decades. She and her husband, former Sarasota Mayor and City Commmissioner Fredd Atkins, are well-known community activists who have previously visited our church.

This is one of the many special nationwide tributes to the children and staff killed 11 years ago at Sandy Hook Elementary in Connecticut and to all victims of gun violence, including suicide, domestic violence, and single and mass shootings.

Come! By Dale Moore

Stand with me at the manger in Bethlehem. Let's stand over here in the corner, kind of in the shadows, between these two cows where we will be out of the way. Would you believe a lamb just curled up on my feet? The smell of hay and the oil burning in the lamp hanging from the low beam, permeate the air. It's almost stifling.



Mary, her gown askew and stained with blood, her dark hair hanging down over her damp forehead, is leaning against the cool stone wall and humming to her new baby cradled in her arms. I cannot even begin to imagine the thoughts spinning round in her head. "How can this be? How is this all possible? How do I mother this child, this special child? Will Joseph stay with me, or will he now decide to put me and the baby away? Oh, Joseph! My Beloved husband." Joseph! He's standing off a bit by himself, over near the opening watching her. This has been quite a night. Helping Mary give birth to her baby is not at all the same thing as birthing sheep. He's exhausted...and worried. "What will people think? Who is the father of this child? Certainly not me!" Looking at Mary he stares lovingly at this young woman, hardly more than a girl. "Poor child! It is all so surreal." Even in the dim light he can see her tiredness in the slump of her shoulders and the nodding of her head. But then what should anyone expect after the journey of these past few days and now giving birth. She had had a vision. He himself had had a vision. Was it real? They had spent evenings, he and Mary, talking ... about her vision ... about his vision. And then there was the miracle of Elizabeth. But what would the priests in the temple make of all of that when Joseph presented the boy for circumcision? And if our families knew the truth about her being pregnant before ... They could ... they could actually stone this beautiful young woman now nursing her son for the first time.

There is some kind of hubbub just beyond Joseph outside the circle of light. Men crying and singing and rejoicing and babbling. As the small group crowds into the light, we see men of all ages, big men, rough looking men, smelly, crude men ... shepherds, by the looks of them and they literally fall in adoration before Mary and the baby. One young man gently lays the lamb he is carrying at her feet and backs away in silence. The leader of the group tells Joseph they saw angels in the fields over the sheep. They too saw angels? Not just AN angel, BUT ANGELS who told them to come here. So it was not just he and Mary, but these uneducated, poor men watching sheep out in the fields, who had seen angels. So from our corner, we see it all. Mary, Joseph, the baby, the shepherds. And if we stay long enough, we will get to see the wise sages who have traveled hundreds of miles from the East to join those who are here now. Wait a minute! To have traveled that far and arrive when they did, they must have been compelled to start their pilgrimage even before the child's birth. While they are definitely not of David's lineage, they endured the weariness of travel, the dangers along the route, the confusion at Herod's Court, and then their own angels telling them to go home by a different route, all to kneel before this very common-appearing baby and his young mother and to present their very rare and expensive gifts. What compelled them to come?

Mary, Joseph, the child, the common working shepherds, the wealth, and wisdom from far away are all here. Then suddenly I am struck by who is not here. The inn keeper who gave the couple shelter is not here. He's missing all that is happening right here in his own grotto. He opened the doors to them, but he, himself, never came in. And what about his other guests at the inn? He did not lead a single one of them to the Christ. Why? How did he miss it? Was it because he was too busy taking their money for room and drink and food? Were they reveling too late or were they just too tired to see the star shining right above their head? The streets of Bethlehem were teeming with travelers, so many that there had been no more room in any inn in town for them. Now, they were of the house and lineage of David and so from childhood had heard the prophecies that from their family, their tribe, would come a Messiah. But none of them bothered to follow the smelly shepherds down the "alley" to the stable. None of them took time to ask why these men were so excited. The sages had encountered many on their way, yet apparently none of them chose to join the caravan so that they could be here. And where was Herod and his crowd? Those who thought they wielded all power could not be bothered to come to see what all the fuss was about. Was there not one of those who said to Herod, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for so it is written;" not one who said, "I think I'll go, too?" So many, so close, and yet they missed it.

As I stand here in the corner with this cow pushing against me, as I stand here trying to take it all in, I wonder ... how could they not be here ... and, oh, yes, how is that in my busy world where people still do not see or take notice, where prophecies are great for Sunday morning sermons, but not for Monday's workplace, how is that I was so blest to be led here? When ... where did the angel appear to me?
