Gospel Medicine!

One of the invitations of Lent is to be aware and awake to what is grounding and guiding you in life. There are so many gospels in the world that preach and proclaim to us ~ telling us what to do and promising us fame or fortune or our best life ever! Yet, the good news of God's unconditional and unceasing love is one that we open our minds, hearts, souls, and whole lives to every Sunday.

A wonderful invitation would be to read the Gospel of Luke from beginning to end this March as you prepare for Holy Week.

I just heard the moans and groans and the "You can't make me."

If that feels like too much, what if you read what I believe to be the Gospel in a nutshell ~ the **Parable of the Good Samaritan** (Luke 10:25-37) and the **Parable of the Prodigal Family** (Luke 15:11-32). For me, these two narratives represent the **Gospel Medicine to our lives**.



In these stories we explore what a full, authentic life looks like ~ this is the lawyer's question in Luke 10.

The response doesn't come from Jesus, but from the lawyer himself ~ because often behind and beneath our questions we have some sense of an answer, but we may be confused or uncertain and want confirmation from someone else. The lawyer's response is to love God fully ~ from the top of our heads to our pinkie toes **AND** let that love loose on your neighbor.

This provokes Jesus telling us a parable where neighborliness has nothing to do with your address or the person who lives next door. Neighborliness has everything to do with how we reach out to others, especially those on the fringe and fray; those lost and lonely and left out; those sitting by a pool of their own tears. It isn't just our beliefs, but how our values take on flesh ~ just as God took on flesh and breath and bone. Just as Jesus dined with the outcasts, the nobodies by societal standards but somebodies by God's standards! There is so much more to this parable too. What if you got out your Bible and read it. If you have questions, let's talk!





The other Gospel within the Gospel is of the Prodigal Family (Yes, I know usually it is just the son who is called this, but it really is the whole family who has an outlandishness to them). This parable provokes our own emotions around family, siblings, parents, people who have dropped the ball on responsibility and left us hanging, and people who try to advise and fix and save us when we didn't ask for their help.

There is so much in the parable that is worth exploring to see what is awakened in your awareness right here and now. Again, if you have questions about this parable, let's talk! Or better yet, come to the **Wayless Way Book Club** on **March 11**th and 25th when we will discuss the classic, *The Return of the Prodigal Son* by Henri J.M. Nouwen.

The more we explore the Gospel story as singing to our story, the more that **Good News** is not just information for our heads, but transformation for our hearts and whole lives.

I will preach on both parables, but there is more in these words than one sermon or a lifetime of sermons could fully explore or exhaust. I pray you are finding ways to connect with Your divine dustiness this Lent. I pray you are finding ways to reach out with neighborliness, especially to people you are not sure you love or can love you.

I pray God is granting you a holy Lent as we prepare for our Holiest Week, March 24-31.

March 29 ~ Good Friday ~ noon in the Sanctuary and online ~ We gather beneath the cross of Jesus to acknowledge our brokenness and woundedness ~ both individually and collectively. Our choir will sing during the service, and we will move from the Sanctuary out to the Memorial Garden of the Cross at the close of the service.

Dear Church Family,

May God's love and Shalom surround you. On Tuesday, February 20th, the Church Council received this letter from Greg Chestnut:

Many of you know that I was diagnosed with Severe Aplastic Anemia in January of 2023. For over a year now I have been upheld and strengthened by your faithful prayers as I have been learning to function with the limitations and requirements of this disease.

However, I feel that it is time to step down from my role as your Minister of Music. I am in the process of applying for permanent disability effective April 1, 2024.

I cannot begin to express what a gift it has been to serve this church for the past 35 years. There are so many milestones that are easy to measure such as the acquisition of the organ, the expansion of our choirs, and the building of the Chapel & Music Center. But my most profound gratefulness centers around the people, who throughout the generations have supported and shared my vision for our music ministry. To serve a church with such diversity and acceptance as ours is indeed a rare privilege. Your commitment to living out our core values has been an inspiration to me. I could never ask for or imagine a staff to be more supportive; and the friendship, collaboration, and leadership of Pastor Wes is a unique relationship that I cherish. The faithfulness, the talents, the care, and the fun that our choir contributes each week has brought me such joy and has nourished my growth spiritually and as a musician over these many years.

I pray that First Congregational UCC will build upon the musical foundation that we have laid together. May carefully planned worship be celebrated and welcoming in a variety of ways; may we continue to be a home for guest musicians in our community; and may our choir members and our church family strengthen the bonds of friendship that have been woven into the fabric of this place for future generations.

I know reading these words causes so many emotions and thoughts to surface and swirl within each one of us. I invite us into a time of prayer:



God, how can we say thanks for Greg? For the ways he has shined and shared his light with us for 35 years! For his love, care, thoughtfulness, faithfulness, openness, sense of humor, and music ministry that moves our souls, and his presence. How can we honor such faithfulness?

We pray for Greg as he continues to live with his illness. We pray for strength and most of all, O God, Your presence to enfold and hold Greg. May Greg continue to know our love for him every minute of every day. With heartfelt gratitude for all the gifts Greg has and will continue to share, we pray for Your guidance and grace. Amen.

I realize and recognize that there are questions you may have right now. My door is wide open if you wish to talk. **Here are important facts**:

- 1. **This is Greg's church** and will continue to be in the years to come. Greg is moving from the organ bench to the pew, so welcome him warmly to sit alongside you in April.
- 2. We will thank Greg with a wonderful party on **April 7**th at both services.
- 3. Your Moderators and Staffing Team are working faithfully to find an interim Music Minister. Once all the details are finalized, we will introduce the person. Our intention is to have the interim here on April 7th as we hand off the baton. The interim will lead the church choir, handbell choir, and play on Sunday mornings.
- 4. We will form a Search Team that will be guided by our core values, three covenants, and by continuing the vital and vibrant music ministry Greg has built over 35 years.
- 5. We will host listening sessions in the Spring as part of the search process.

We are asking you to continue to pray for Greg, plan to attend the celebration on April 7th, and pray for our church as we enter this time of transition. We trust in God, our help in ages past and hope for years to come; we trust in our precious Lord who takes our hand; we trust in the sweet, sweet Spirit who will help us sing our way into the future.





A reception to meet and greet our new members will take place after the 11 a.m. service. You are welcome to contact the church office and have a conversation with Pastor Wes at any time.








SURE's Great Assembly ~ Monday, March 18th @ 6:30 p.m. Hosted by First Congregational UCC

Easter Love Offering



The Mission Team has turned its attention to Easter and the upcoming Easter Love Offering. We kept our covenants and our core values in mind as we made our selections.

We have chosen six UCC missions and six other missions that support the nation and the world. All have received at least a 94 rating from Charity Navigator this year.

Supporting Our UCC Missions:

One Great Hour of Sharing whose Lenten offering supports disasters and refugees is one of our UCC missions. The Joseph Henry Evans Scholarship Fund is to honor Joseph Evans, the first black president of the UCC, and gives scholarships to black students. The Open and Affirming Coalition for the UCC helps churches become welcoming and supports those churches who already are. Neighbors In Need gives grants to churches for environmental justice, online ministry, and advocacy initiatives. Strengthen The Church works on leadership development, establishing new churches and youth ministry. "Join the Movement" UCC Racial Justice is working to raise \$8 million over the next three years. Half of the money will be used for supporting racial justice now and half to put in an endowment fund for future work.

Missions Supporting Our Nation/World:

- **Back Bay Mission** does tireless work on the Mississippi Gulf Coast to strengthen neighborhoods and seek justice.
- The **Coalition of Immokalee Workers** does so much to advocate for farm workers and has expanded their role in Fair Trade and human rights.

- Bread for the World Institute whose mission is to educate and equip people to advocate for
 policies and programs to end hunger in the United States and throughout the world.
- **Church World Service** is a faith-based organization that works on sustainable responses to hunger, poverty, displacement, and disaster.
- **Water Engineers for the Americas and Africa** honors our Creation Justice Covenant. They send engineers all over the world to bring clean water to those in need.

The Farm Bill sets national policies for nutrition, agriculture, conservation, and forestry. It provides nutrition assistance to millions of Americans through programs such as SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program), which typically gets **the largest funding share** of any program in the Farm Bill.

If you're considering adding a new pet to the family, please adopt rather than buy a pet from an online retailer or pet store. By adopting from an animal shelter or rescue group, you are ensuring that you are not supporting and endorsing the inhumane commercial breeding facilities (puppy mills) that supply pet stores and sell pets online. As an extra bonus, you are doing your part to fight pet overpopulation and save homeless animals from euthanasia.

Please keep your cats indoors. Here is why this is important:

Keeps Wildlife Safe Fewer Diseases and Parasites Safe from Car Accidents Safe from Wildlife and Stray Animals No Cat Fights No Lost Cats Safe from Other People Control Their Diet Longer Lifespan



When cat owners spay or neuter their feline companions, it helps curb the population growth. Millions of feral (wild) and unwanted domestic cats are born each year, leading to overcrowded shelters and often grim outcomes like abandonment or euthanasia. The most egregious human practice with cats is to let unneutered cats roam outside, which leads to the tragedy of millions of feral cats breeding, fighting, and starving to death.




Artful Prayer ~ Thursday, March 14th 2 p.m. ~ Oasis Center or Zoom




