
#### **Donna Blakey**

Nearly half of the students enrolled in Sarasota County schools participate in free and reduced-price meal programs. In DeSoto County, that number is 100%. When school ends, hunger begins. #### **New Native Plants on Campus**



For the last several months, the Facilities and Grounds Team, with assistance from the Green Team, has been researching and planting new 'native' plants in our gardens. **Our initial focus has been on the Memorial Garden where our beautiful cross is located.** 

Florida Native plants require much less maintenance overall and can withstand less water especially in the summer when the rains may be less than normal. This occurred last summer. Native plants will survive more easily without the need for supplements or fertilizer. **This is a Win-Win situation for the church.** 

Native plants were added to our Memorial Garden and to the beds on both sides of the Sanctuary. Look out the windows of the Sanctuary when you have a chance! It will take several months to for these new plants to grow and fill in the spaces. Hopefully, the new plants will require much less weeding in the summer when the heat and humidity are so high.

The most important reason for using native plants is that they provide and create much needed habitat for our wildlife such as birds and butterflies. We look forward to enjoying these new plants as they mature and add more beauty and peaceful spaces on our campus.

We thank our Lord for creating such a beautiful green place for us to worship. This entire project has been made possible by a generous donation from a member of our congregation.

## COLLAGE NEWS~ by Rev. Katrina Roseboro-Marsh Executive Director of the Open and Affirming (ONA) Coalition of the UCC

Roseboro-March uses the acronym LGBTQIAN2S+ to describe the people she serves. She began using this acronym soon after beginning her role at the ONA Coalition following conversations with individuals who felt left out with the LGBTQ+ acronym. The "I" is for intersex, the "A" is for asexual/agender, the "N" is for non-binary or (gender) non-conforming, and the "2S" is for two-spirit.

"I wanted something that could intentionally broaden honoring the even more marginalized within the already existing marginalization of the community," she said.


